Continued study of the language; reading of selected prose and poetry by ancient Greek authors; development of translation skills.

Precludes additional credit for GREK 2001.

In this course, we will continue to work through Shelmerdine's textbook and then read unadapted Greek passages.

Text to purchase:

C.W. Shelmerdine, *Introduction to Greek*. 2nd ed. (Focus, 2008).

Additional readings in Xenophon (or other authors) will be supplied or available online.

Requirements:

The final date for withdrawal from this course without academic penalty is **April 8, 2016**.

Course material:

- We will continue to work through the morphology and syntax of the textbook, but the latter half of this course will focus more on translating basic unadapted passages of Greek prose, mostly from Xenophon's *Anabasis*. We may have the opportunity to read other passages from requested authors, such as Aristotle and Sophocles too.
- You are still required to stay on top of material week by week. Expect to review and prep for this course every day in short but regular study sessions.
- Students must prepare for, attend and contribute to each class. Students who do not will fall behind and may fail the course.
- The format and nature of tests will be explained in detail beforehand but you can expect passages to translate (both prepared and sight) on each test.

Make-up tests will only be given for valid, documented reasons. The professor must be informed of such cases *immediately*. Make-up tests are normally written within one week of the original test and at the convenience of the professor.

Academic offences: All students are expected to know what constitutes an academic offence, to avoid committing academic offences, and to take responsibility for their academic actions. Academic offenses include things like plagiarism, cheating, improper research, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc. When an offence is committed, penalties will be imposed by the Associate Dean in accordance with the regulations of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

A normal penalty for a first offence is a mark of zero for the work affected. Stiffer penalties may be imposed, and are normal for repeat offenders.

COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as “*presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one’s own.*” This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else’s published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one’s own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another’s data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another’s works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in “*substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs.*”

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course’s instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of “F” for the course
