LATN 1006 is a course for students who have completed LATN 1005 with a passing grade. Course work involves the material from Wheelock's *Capita XIII – XXIV* and readings in Groton & May. For both textbooks see below. The texts provide both original and adapted sentences and readings from a wide range of Latin authors. There will also be some practice in translation from English into Latin.

The grammar to be covered this term includes: reflexive and relative pronouns, third declension adjectives, third declension *i*-stem nouns as well as fourth and fifth declension nouns, the passive voice including the passive periphrastic of all conjugations, further uses for the ablative case including the ablative absolute, participles, etc.

Course work will consist of the writing of a test (20%) after every four *capita* of Wheelock: two tests, therefore, worth a total of 40%; there will also be a final exam (40%).¹ Dates for the two tests are indicated below; the two-hour final will be written in the April exam period. Four quizzes worth 5% each (20% in total) (for which see below) will complete the course requirements for LATN 1006. *If you miss any tests or quizzes, a doctor's note will be required for a make-up.*

*Steady work along with **regular attendance** throughout the term is essential to keeping on top of the course material.* (See p. ii following for the text for the course.)

¹ On the tests leading up to the final the stress will be on the material immediately preceding them. The final will be cumulatively based on the *grammar* from the class tests plus the material from Wheelock's *Capita XXI – XXIV*. Keep in mind, though, that language learning is naturally cumulative, and so a broad knowledge of earlier material will always be assumed.

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as “*presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one’s own.*” This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else’s published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one’s own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another’s data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another’s works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in “*substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs.*”

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course’s instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of “F” for the course
