| Winter 2027 | HIST 1004A | Europe in War and Cold War | Examination of Europe from the Second World War through the Cold War and beyond. Topics may include wartime occupation regimes and resistance movements; the Holocaust; Cold War divisions and memory cultures; decolonization and migration; youth cultures and protest; and the collapse of communist regimes. | 0.5 credit | In-person | 180 | 2 TA @ 260 hours | Candidates are required to have experience in teaching European history in the period covered by this course. A record of publications in the history of the United States from 1865 would be an asset. |
| Winter 2027 | HIST 2706A | Ancient and Pre-Colonial Africa | Ancient African cultures and civilizations, the trans-Saharan trade system, and the trans-Atlantic and Indian Ocean slave trades from 600 BCE to the 19th century. | 0.5 credit | In-person | 120 | 1 TA @ 130 hours | Candidates are required to have experience in teaching the history of ancient and re-colonial Africa. A record of relevant publications would be an asset. |
