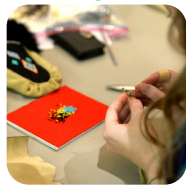
Ojigkwanong Centre

The Ojigkwanong Indigenous Student Centre is a place where First Nation (Status or Non-Status), Inuk, and Métis students can study, socialize, and participate in academic and cultural programming. Located at 228 Paterson Hall, this space features a medicine lodge, kitchenette, lounge, study space, computer lab, and telephone booth.

Weekly, Monthly and Annual Programming



The Indigenous Academic and Cultural Programs Coordinator develops weekly, monthly, and annual programming to support Indigenous students. Programming includes but is not limited to Baker's Circle, Inuit cultural programming, a maker's circle, wellness workshops, drop-in beading, student orientations, and more.

Individual Culturally-Relevant Counselling Services

The Centre has two in-house accredited psychotherapists to help support First Nation (Status or Non-Status), Inuk, and Métis students. The students can reach out to the Centre, request to meet with a counsellor, and work through their concerns. Students do not need to worry about payment or insurance, as this service is free of charge to all Indigenous students.

Annual Kinàmàgawin Symposium

According to Call #12 of the Kinàmàgawin Report, one large university-wide Indigenous event will occur to facilitate relationship building, learning and appreciation of Indigenous cultures and ways of knowing.

The Kinàmàgawin Symposium is a free and open event that addresses timely topics, chosen by Indigenous students. This event serves to empower students, staff, and faculty at Carleton (Indigenous or not) to further their knowledge on Indigenous topics and help pursue a journey of allyship.

Medicine Lodges



There are two medicine lodges located on campus: in Ojigkwanong, located in Paterson Hall, and Stormont House, located in the residence village. Here, Indigenous community members have access to a space where they can smudge and engage in personal ceremonies anytime they need to.

The Centre provides traditional medicines (sage, sweetgrass, cedar, and tobacco), drums, qulliqs, and shakers to aid with personal self-reflection. This is also a place where Elders and Knowledge Keepers can teach and provide spiritual guidance to others.

Indigenous Peer Mentorship Program

The Indigenous Peer Mentor Program helps first-year students transition to university life by promoting student engagement and a sense of belonging on campus.



The Indigenous Peer Mentor Program matches new self-identified Indigenous students at Carleton University with experienced Indigenous students who act as mentors, providing academic and social support and ongoing advice. This program provides members with social, academic and cultural development, peer-to-peer support, and activities to support community building and personal growth.

Indigenous Enriched Support Program (IESP)

The Indigenous Enriched Support Program (IESP) is designed for First Nations (status & non-status), Métis and Inuk learners who wish to pursue post-secondary education. Students will take first-year credit courses while benefiting from a supportive environment of peer mentors, academic coaches, academic advising and personalized workshops. Upon completion of the program, students will qualify and be supported in the process of applying for a degree program.

The Indigenous Enriched Support Program is ideal for students who are unsure of what program to pursue, who are returning to school after some time away, looking for additional supports during the transition to post-secondary education or those who do not meet the full criteria for a degree program.

Ceremony Spaces Across Campus

We offer culturally grounded mediation support rooted in Indigenous ways of knowing, designed to help restore safety, trust, and accountability in the classroom. Our approach centers the voices and experiences of Indigenous students while working collaboratively with instructors to support learning, responsibility, and growth for everyone involved. Support may include one-on-one consultations, facilitated conversations, and personalized strategies for responding to harm or discomfort in relational and respectful ways.

Indigenous Policy and Program Development

Carleton University Strategic Indigenous Initiatives Committee (CUSIIC)



In 2018, Carleton formed CUSIIC to renew its Indigenous Strategy and strengthen ties with Indigenous communities. Over 18 months, the committee held 40+ sessions with 600+ participants to explore how Carleton can better support Indigenous students, integrate Indigenous knowledge, and improve community engagement.

The result of this process was the committee's final report entitled *Kinàmàgawin: Learning Together*, which included recommendations and 41 Carleton-specific Calls to Action.

Hiring Policy for Positions Limited to Indigenous (First Nations, Inuit, and Métis) Candidates

This Policy outlines the process for verifying the Indigenous identity of applicants for positions reserved for Indigenous candidates at Carleton. Admissions and Awards Limited to Indigenous (First Nation, Métis and Inuit) Candidates Policy

This Policy outlines the process for verifying Indigenous identity for applicants to Indigenous-specific program seats, awards, grants, and scholarships.
