<p>Financial Aid (SEMP)</p>	<p>The Swiss Federal Council gives financial aid to all European students as compensation for the former Erasmus Mobility Grant. The amount of the grant is either CHF 1900 or CHF 2200 per semester, depending on the country of the home institution.</p>																								
<p>Arrival Information</p>	<p>Zurich Airport (Kloten): 15 minutes by train to Winterthur main station</p> <p>Basel Airport (EuroAirport): 2 hours by bus and train to Winterthur main station</p> <p>Geneva Airport: 3.5 hours by train to Winterthur main station</p> <p>The ZHAW School of Management and Law is only a 5-minute walk from Winterthur main station.</p>

Visa and Health Insurance	
<p>Visa and Residence Permit</p>	<p>Non-EU citizens need a student visa and must apply early (immediately after receiving their letter of acceptance).</p> <p>Students from Australia, Japan, New Zealand, Malaysia, Singapore and the United Kingdom do not need a visa, but they must apply for a “<i>Zusicherung der Aufenthaltsbewilligung</i>” (assurance of residence permit) through the SML International Office.</p> <p>All exchange students must apply for a residence permit (L-Permit) upon arrival.</p> <p>Proof of financial solvency (CHF 1,750 per month) is required for both visa and residence permit applications.</p> <p>After the application process has been finalized, the International Office will provide further information on how to apply for a visa/residence permit.</p>
<p>Health Insurance</p>	<p>Basic health insurance is mandatory by law in Switzerland and can be obtained after the student’s arrival. Detailed information will be provided during Orientation Week.</p> <p>Non-EU residents must purchase Swiss health insurance (as low as CHF 61 per month); international health insurance obtained in the student’s home country is usually not sufficient.</p> <p>EU residents with EHIC cards are exempt from this obligation. They need to submit a copy of their card, which must be valid for their entire stay in Switzerland.</p>
