**COURSE OBJECTIVES & CONTENT:** This course is an introduction to Private Law in Canada, specifically relating to the concept of legal entities, and the law of property as it relates to women, the disabled, the family, and, in addition, the changing nature of property itself.

The law of Persons and Property will also examine how the law works, what role courts, lawyers and judges play, and why the law works the way it does.
