#### **GENERAL**

This course is an extension of the theories and approaches that are typically dealt with in LAWS 2301. It is designed to provide a practical introduction to Criminal Law in Canada and to the institution, processes and rules. The goal is to highlight the elements of criminal offences and to examine various legal defences and their effectiveness in the system.

Students will be provided with an opportunity to put their theoretical knowledge to use in formal practice through a class assignment. In this course, the focus will be on legal jurisprudence and various sections *The Criminal Code* of Canada.

#### MATERIALS /TEXTBOOKS

A. Required Text: Criminal Law in Canada: An Introduction to the Theoretical, Social and Legal Context 5<sup>th</sup> Edition – Authored by Ron Saunders and Rebecca Jaremko Bromwich. The text will be available at the University Bookstore and will be on Reserve at the University Library.

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B. Strongly Recommended: Criminal Justice in Canada by Colin Goff 6<sup>TH</sup> edition. The text is available at the University Bookstore and will be on reserve at the university library. Specific sections of the text will be required and referenced for this course.
