Course Outline

CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

A review of the Youth Criminal Justice Act within the framework of the Canadian justice system, with particular emphasis on historical and philosophical developments and objectives. Current topics include: constitutional issues, procedure, confessions, transfers, sentencing options, alternative measures, reviews, and possible amendments.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an extension of the concepts and information that were covered in LAWS 2301 and 2302. It is designed to provide a practical introduction to Youth and Criminal Law in Canada and to the institution, processes and rules. The goal is to highlight the elements of criminal offences, the policies, procedures and foundation of law relating to young persons involved in the criminal justice system. This course will also examine the effectiveness of the various approaches taken when dealing with young persons.

Students will be provided with an opportunity to put their theoretical knowledge to use through the completion of a class assignment.

REQUIRED TEXTS

Required Text: Youth Criminal Justice Law - Authored by Nicholas Bala and Sanjeev Anand.

EVALUATION
