CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

The concepts employed by the law for creating and enforcing legal obligations between persons within society, including contract, tort, fiduciary obligation and restitution. Consideration is given to the role of persons and the role of the state in ordering private legal obligations.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to private law relationships and examines the common law relating to contracts, torts (civil wrongs), trust law, and the interaction of private law relationships and public law (statute law passed by governments).

The course reviews concepts employed by the law for creating and enforcing legal obligations between persons within society, including contract, tort, fiduciary obligation and restitution. Consideration is given to the role of persons and the equitable and legal role of the state in ordering private legal obligations.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be introduced to Private Law causes of action based on Contracts, Torts and Trust Law and should achieve a fundamental understanding of the basic legal elements making up each of these disciplines. Students will then be able to combine them with relevant Public Law Statutes for a complete understanding of how private and public law operate in a practical way, in Canadian courts.

Use of generative artificial intelligence tools (e.g. ChatGPT):

- Any use of generative AI tools to produce assessed content is considered a violation of academic integrity standards.
- AI tools are not permitted in this course for either the mid-term assignment or the final exam.

PLAGIARISM

The University Academic Integrity Policy defines plagiarism as “*presenting, whether intentionally or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one’s own.*” This includes reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else’s published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one’s own without proper citation or reference to the original source. Examples of sources from which the ideas, expressions of ideas or works of others may be drawn from include but are not limited to: books, articles, papers, literary compositions and phrases, performance compositions, chemical compounds, artworks, laboratory reports, research results, calculations and the results of calculations, diagrams, constructions, computer reports, computer code/software, material on the internet and/or conversations.

Examples of plagiarism include, but are not limited to:

- any submission prepared in whole or in part, by someone else, including the unauthorized use of generative AI tools (e.g., ChatGPT);
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, paraphrased material, algorithms, formulae, scientific or mathematical concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another’s data or research findings without appropriate acknowledgement;
- submitting a computer program developed in whole or in part by someone else, with or without modifications, as one’s own; and
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another’s work and/or failing to use quotations marks.

Plagiarism is a serious offence that cannot be resolved directly by the course's instructor. The Associate Dean of the Faculty conducts a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course.
