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CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to legal rules and theoretical approaches for critically understanding the creation, interpretation, and enforcement of those rules; the role of judges, juries, lawyers, and lay persons; adjudication and alternative dispute resolution; relationship of law with social change and justice; challenges with access to justice.

COURSE OBJECTIVE

This course is about basic legal rules and processes, and the key players in the legal system. The course also examines the accessibility of the legal system, including legal education, the police, the judiciary, and the legal profession.
