CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

Origins and scope of the concept of person in law and how concepts of legal personality change over time. Origins and scope of the concept of property and how concepts of property change over time.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines the distinction between public and private law, and private law relationships specifically relating to the concepts of legal entities, legal personality, legal standing, and the law of property as it relates to women, the disabled, the family, and the changing nature of property itself. How concepts of personhood and property are created and protected in law, and how legal categories and concepts embody particular visions of social life will be emphasized. The course will also emphasize the role played by the state in the ordering of private law relations. You should learn about how law works, the impact of law, why particular rules exist, and what role the Charter of Rights plays as well.
