CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

The legal and social dimensions of criminal liability and responsibility in Canada, including issues and problems surrounding mens rea, actus reus, and the attachment of liability. Excuses and justifications, the Canadian Criminal Code and the role of the Charter in the criminal legal system.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an extension of the theories and approaches that are typically dealt with in LAWS 2301. It is designed to provide a practical introduction to Criminal Law in Canada and to the institutions, processes and rules. The goal is to highlight the elements of criminal offences and to examine various legal defenses and their effectiveness in the system.

Students will be provided with an opportunity to put their theoretical knowledge to use in formal practice through a class assignment. In this course, the focus will be on legal jurisprudence and various sections of *The Criminal Code* of Canada

REQUIRED TEXTS

Required Text: Criminal Law in Canada: An Introduction to the Theoretical, Social and Legal Context 5th Edition – Authored by Ron Saunders and Rebecca Bromwich.
