CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

The legal and social dimensions of criminal liability and responsibility in Canada, including issues and problems surrounding mens rea, actus reus, and the attachment of liability. Excuses and justifications, the Canadian Criminal Code and the role of the Charter in the criminal legal system.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an extension of the theories and approaches that are typically dealt with in first year law. It is designed to provide a practical introduction to Criminal Law in Canada and to the institutions, processes and rules. The goal is to highlight various crimes and their elements, while examining various legal defences and their effectiveness in the system.
