CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

Law relating to the state, society, and the constitution, with a focus on the historical framework, federalism, and constitutional reform in Canada.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

We will review the role of the state, examining the Constitution with an emphasis on the federal system, its interpretation, change, and reform. Among other things, we will look closely at the text of the Constitution, the social forces responsible for its creation, and several early legal decisions responsible for its initial application. As well, we will review modern Supreme Court rulings that deal with key areas of the Constitution to understand how that document has evolved as Canada has matured as a country.

This course is an asynchronous online course where the instructor and students share information, ideas, and learning experiences in a virtual course space. Asynchronous courses do not have live, scheduled lectures online. However, students are expected to remain up to

date with the deadlines and due dates provided by the instructor. These courses require highspeed Internet access and a computer. Students should read the assigned materials before viewing the relevant class as the readings will serve as a departure point for the topics discussed each lecture.
