COURSE DESCRIPTION

Forms of carrying on business activity: proprietorships, partnerships, corporations and Crown entities. The rights and obligations of such business enterprises both internally and in relation with other persons. The relationship between legal form and economic function. The role of state intervention.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

- LAWS 3201 is a course that studies the different forms of business organization, including proprietorships, partnerships and corporations.
- Business identity and consequences resulting from form will be emphasized, including the risks of adopting each form, both from a legal, practical and policy perspective. Using material from the text, lectures, legal cases and case studies students will learn the basic forms of business organization and the advantages and disadvantages of each.

- The goal is to situate business enterprises law within its general social setting, practically and theoretically, and to examine the interrelationship between the aspirations and practices of each. The class will also look in detail at the participants and parties in the business law system, and in particular examine the mechanisms of accountability and control for these actors and their relative effectiveness. Current examples and reforms will be discussed throughout the course to highlight the pertinent issues and problems within the business environment.
- Students will be able at the end of the course to create a corporation and understand the legal implications.

TERM PAPER

- The term paper deals with a critical issue dealing with the governance of a corporation in Canada. The paper, between 22 to 25 pages, double spaced will outline approaches to deal with the issue raised in the paper and possible solutions. The table of contents of the paper is as following:
 - . Executive summary
 - . Introduction (ethics, methodology, stakeholders and objectives of the paper)
 - . Legal situation under study and explanations
 - . Legal legislation, jurisprudence and relevant legal content on the subject matter
 - . Solutions or approaches to resolve the situation and the measures for execution
 - . Recommendations and lessons learned.

The Term Paper: While the emphasis will be placed on the novelty of the argument and the critical analysis thereof, the paper will be graded on the basis of the following considerations:

1. Topic: free topic but must be related to the course topics, relevant.

- 2. Thesis: clear statement of argument at the outset (ideally in the introduction), novelty!
- 3. Research: breadth and depth of research focusing on argument.
- 4. Analysis: critical, interdisciplinary, depth, focus on argument, logic, balance

5. Originality: novelty, insight, thought-provoking.

6. Evidence: primarily scholarly references to support claims; avoid quotations, instead paraphrase authors' ideas using your own words and citing source.

7. Readings: a minimum of 7 readings from the library must be cited. References to course readings do not necessarily have to be central to the paper argument.

8. Organization: clear structure throughout paper i.e. introduction, development of argument by articulating the key claims with supportive references, conclusion

9. Style: clarity, flow, avoid long sentences and paragraphs, correct citation format (McGill format is preferred) and grammar.

10. Length: maximum 22-25 double-spaced pages. Please do not waste space and time describing the topic without developing your argument or discussing issues that are not central to the argument of your paper.

11. Deadline: March 26, 2020

12. Submission: students must hand in their final essays by the deadline and in class. Email submissions of final papers are not permitted. Late submissions will not be accepted and will receive the grade of zero.
