CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

The enforcement of promises and agreements; basic doctrines and underlying principles of the law of contract are studied from formation of the contract to remedies for breach of contract; role of contract for economic and social purposes is also considered.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The main aim of this course is to provide the foundation necessary to critically analyse legal issues arising from agreements voluntarily entered into by two or more parties. We will study real and hypothetical cases with the goal of helping you to develop an understanding of how contracts are formed and how courts characterize and interpret contract terms as well as statements that are made in the contracting process but that are not part of the contract. In examining the cases, students are encouraged to critically reflect upon various theories of contract law and to carefully consider recent legislative and judicial shifts away from the traditional view that people are free to contract as they wish. Approaches to these issues in contexts involving Indigenous peoples will be discussed.
