The Department of Law and Legal Studies invites applications from qualified candidates for a preliminary (tenure track) appointment at the rank of **Assistant Professor** beginning **July 1, 2016**.

Description

The Department of Law and Legal Studies invites applications from qualified candidates in critical migration, refugee, and immigration law and policy. The qualified candidate will be expected to conduct research, teach, and supervise in one or more of the following areas: global migration, detention, and border control; Canadian refugee and immigration law in a transnational context; transnational "cimmigration" and securitization; and, citizenship, deportation, movements, and the boundaries of community.

Qualifications

Candidates should hold a doctoral degree, or the equivalent, in legal studies, law or a related discipline and demonstrate a capacity for theoretically-informed, interdisciplinary scholarship and teaching. The successful candidate will have the ability to develop an externally-funded, high quality research program; will be committed to effective teaching at the undergraduate and graduate level; and will contribute effectively to the academic life of the Department, the Faculty and the University.
