Qualifications

Candidates should hold (or be close to completing) a doctoral degree, or the equivalent, in legal studies, law or a related discipline with a record of effective undergraduate teaching. Preference will be given to those candidates with teaching experience in the Department.

Description

The successful candidate will be expected to teach high-enrolment core courses in our undergraduate program, primarily at the first and second year levels.

- a curriculum vitae;
- a teaching portfolio, including evidence of teaching performance and sample course outline;
- a statement of teaching philosophy/pedagogy;
