Week 1

From Kyivan Rus to the USSR: why does Russo-Ukrainian history matter so much today?

Week 2

The Collapse of the Soviet Union resulted in a democratic transit and reshaping of European state borders, economic and security cooperation. During this lecture, we will analyze the roles that both Ukraine and Russia play in regional transition.

Week 3

The last lecture will focus on a few questions about the war in Europe: What triggered Russia's invasion of Ukraine? What are the possible scenarios to end the war? What will the new security architecture in Europe will look like after the war?
