- P6 Near Bronson Avenue, beside Anniversary Park

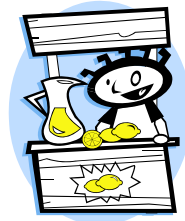

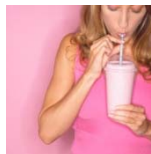
