#### **Course description:**

The Old English Rune Poem is the earliest and longest of the extant medieval rune poems, and as such provides invaluable perspective on the futhorc. In the early eighteenth century, a transcript of the poem was published as part of George Hickes' encyclopedic treasurebox of northern antiquities. In 1731, the manuscript was lost in the Cotton Library fire at Ashburnham House. By the twentieth century, white supremacists had begun recasting the runes as an ancient source of northern and therefore white wisdom. For a number of years now, medievalists of colour have led the way as scholars have begun to reevaluate the history of medieval studies and the field's complicity in white supremacy. In this course, we will read these contemporary medievalists' analysis of the history and stakes of the field. We will explore the Old English Rune Poem, beloved by modern runers but neglected by scholars, and examine how runes were situated in early medieval English manuscripts, as well as in the work of scholars

establishing the field at the beginning of the eighteenth century. Student-led enquiry will drive our investigations throughout the first half of the course. Finally, utilizing the resources within the Carleton University Book Arts Lab, in the second half of the term, we will reconstruct both Hickes' 1705 transcript and the lost manuscript of the Old English Rune Poem.

#### **Learning Outcomes:**

Students will discuss trends in medievalism from its development in the Early Modern period through the present day.

Students will be introduced to Old English poetry (in translation) and its manuscript contexts. Students will be introduced to descriptions of medieval manuscripts and modern editorial practices. Students will be introduced to medieval manuscript production and letterpress printing and will experience writing in a medieval bookhand and setting type.

**Texts:** Maureen Halsall, *The Old English Rune Poem: A Critical Edition* (U Toronto P, 1981). This textbook is required and on order at the university bookstore. Additional required and supplementary readings will be provided through Brightspace and MacOdrum Library.

## Deferred Term Work

In some situations, students are unable to complete term work because of extenuating circumstances beyond their control, which forces them to delay submission of the work. Requests for academic consideration are made in accordance with the <u>Academic Consideration Policy for Students in Medical or Other Extenuating Circumstances.</u>

- 1. Students who claim short-term extenuating circumstances (normally lasting up to five days) as a reason for missed term work are held responsible for immediately informing the instructor concerned and for making alternate arrangements with the instructor. If the instructor requires supporting documentation, the instructor may only request submission of the University's self-declaration form, which is available on the <a href="Registrar's Office website">Registrar's Office website</a>. The alternate arrangement must be made before the last day of classes in the term as published in the academic schedule.
  - a. Normally, any deferred term work will be completed by the last day of term. In all cases, formative evaluations providing feedback to the student should be replaced with formative evaluations. In the event the altered due date must extend beyond the last day of classes in the term, the instructor will assign a grade of zero for the work not submitted and submit the student's earned grade accordingly; the instructor may submit a change of grade at a later date. Term work cannot be deferred by the Registrar.
- 2. In cases where a student is not able to complete term work due to extenuating circumstances lasting for a significant period of time/ long-term (normally more than five days), the instructor and/or student may elect to consult with the Registrar's Office (undergraduate courses) or Graduate Registrar (graduate courses) to determine appropriate action.
- 3. If a student is concerned the instructor did not respond to the request for academic consideration or did not provide reasonable accommodation, the student should follow the appeals process described in the Academic Consideration Policy.
- 4. If academic consideration is granted, but the student is unable to complete the accommodation according to the terms set out by the instructor as a result of further illness, injury, or extraordinary circumstances beyond their control, the student may submit a petition to the Registrar's Office (undergraduate courses)/Graduate Registrar (graduate courses). Please note, however, that the course instructor will be required to submit an earned final grade and further consideration will only be reviewed according to established precedents and deadlines. ## **Deferred Final Exams**

Students who are unable to write a final examination because of extenuating circumstances, as defined in the <u>Academic Consideration Policy</u>, may apply for accommodation. Normally, the accommodation for a missed final examination will be granting the student the opportunity to write a deferred examination. In

specific cases when it is not possible to offer a deferred examination, and with the approval of the Dean, an alternate accommodation may be made.

The application for a deferral must:

- 1. be made in writing to the Registrar's Office no later than three (3) working days after the original final examination or the due date of the take-home examination; and,
- 2. be fully supported by appropriate documentation. In cases of short-term extenuating circumstances normally lasting no more than five (5) days, students must include the University's self-declaration form, which can be found on <a href="tel:the Registrar's Office website">the Registrar's Office website</a>. Additional documentation is required in cases of extenuating circumstances lasting longer than five (5) days and must be supported by a medical note specifying the date of onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time of the examination. The University's preferred medical form can be found at the Registrar's Office <a href="here">here</a>.

### Financial vs. Academic Withdrawal

Make sure that you are aware of the separate deadlines for Financial and Academic withdrawal!

Making registration decisions in Carleton Central involves making a financial and academic commitment for the courses you choose, regardless of attendance. If you do not attend, you must withdraw in <a href="Central">Central</a> within the published deadlines to cancel your registration. A fee adjustment is dependent on registration being canceled within the published <a href="fee deadlines">fee deadlines</a> and dependent on your course load. A course dropped after the deadline for financial withdrawal will receive a grade of Withdrawn (WDN), which appears on your official transcript.

Even if you miss the deadline for financial withdrawal, you might decide to drop a course to avoid a failure or a poor grade showing up on your student record and bringing down your CGPA. It is your responsibility to drop the course via Carleton Central within the published deadlines (see Academic Withdrawal).

If you are considering withdrawing from a course, you may want to talk to an advisor first. Course withdrawal may affect your student status, as well as your eligibility for student funding, immigration status, residence accommodation and participation in varsity sports, etc. Additionally, remember that once you choose your courses, you must use the "Calculate amount to pay" button to determine the correct amount of fees to pay.

Carleton Central is your one-stop shop for registration activities. If you are interested in taking a course, make sure to complete your registration. Simply attending a course does not mean you are registered in it, nor is it grounds for petition or appeal.
