From 2005-2008, 2012, CIFP is engaged in multi-stakeholder project development for the Canadian Government's policy on Failed and Fragile States. The work of CIFP entails a methodology for monitoring country performance and assessing the relevance and impact of Canadian policy. A Scientific Committee chaired by the PI provides oversight of the project. The CIFP project has been and will continue to be responsible for hiring the largest number of project-related research assistance at NPSIA. CIFP will continue to work with DND and CIDA as the project evolves.

Under my direction, CSDS support enabled the NPSIA Research Centre to acquire important specialized publications that meet the research and teaching requirements of students and faculty in Security and Defence Studies. The CSDS publishing program issued several titles in the Working Paper series and assisted the publication of the annual volume of *Canada Among Nations*. Summary of Contributions to Research and Training

My experience in policy relevant research leading teams of researchers on major government initiatives included designing and contributing to multi stakeholder programmes on behalf of various organizations including FEWER, CIDA, UNDP. I have held grants from SSHRC, CIDA, DFAIT, IDRC and a variety of international organizations including the UNDP, and the UNU serving as principal investigator for all of them. As principal investigator for Country Indicators for Foreign Policy I have various publications on fragile states, policy analysis, and diaspora processes influencing state fragility and democracy and governance. He was the principal investigator for a major CIDA funded initiative on mainstreaming research and mobilizing knowledge on failed and fragile states into policy making over the 2004-2007 period with contributions agreement totaling 600,000. Under my direction, the DND funded CSDS appointed several Post-Doctoral Fellows, a CCHS-funded Human Security Research Fellow, a Visiting Research Fellow and several pre-Doctoral Fellows. Several Research Assistants were also employed. In addition to major international conferences several specialized conferences, seminars and workshops were held, five as joint initiatives with other universities, institutions and non-governmental organizations. Strategic Analysis Seminars were organized for distinguished international speakers and senior officials of DND and the inter-departmental community. CSDS support enabled the NPSIA Research Centre to acquire important specialized publications that meet the research and teaching requirements of students and faculty in Security and Defence Studies. The CSDS publishing program issued several titles in the Working Paper series and assisted the publication of the annual volume of Canada Among Nations. CSDS contributed to upgrading the NPSIA Information Technology capability, updated and improved its website, and implemented electronic networking initiatives including a live webcast of the Changing Canadian Foreign Policy Conference. CSDS supported the Intel-Net Security and Intelligence internet newsgroup, circulated to a select list of 130 officials (Canadian and international), academics, journalists, legal and judicial professionals, and non-governmental organisations. It also co-sponsors a best paper award by a junior scholar that is published in CFPJ annually. Under my direction the Journal has generated working relationship with a number of organisations, including the Balsillie School of International Affairs, Fulbright Canada and the Association of Canadian Studies in the USA (ACSUS), has won several competitive grants from SSHRCC and recently published a special issue on diaspora and development in partnership with the University of West Indies with funding from IDRC (see <http://www.tandfonline.com/toc/rcfp20/>).

My relevant expertise in research, project management and leadership is supported by the range of outputs that have been produced – having authored or co-authored many policy-oriented publications, have conducted outreach programmes, organized conferences and engaged both the public and policy communities through a somewhat unconventional, but effective approach based on interdisciplinary solutions. In 2000-2001, I was awarded a Fellowship with the Program on Intrastate Conflict and Conflict Prevention at the Belfer Center in Science and International Affairs, JFK School of Government, Harvard

University. Two Research Achievement Awards from Carleton University along with a Petro-Canada Young Innovators Award followed. The research for these awards focused on developing and enhancing Canadian contributions to the study of international affairs. My research tends to be interdisciplinary and collaborative. Although the methodology emphasizes overarching theoretical and empirical assumptions and relies on both qualitative and quantitative procedures, its evaluation is also to be weighed in terms of its policy implications. As a major contributor to development and conflict management policy, Canada has much to gain from a better understanding of the modern policy environment. Thus, each of the components of my research contributions is oriented toward the practical problems of international policy analysis and its applications to real world problems.

In 1998, I was awarded a Marcel Cadieux Fellowship. Working with the Planning Secretariat at DFAIT, he used this opportunity to develop the Country Indicators for Foreign Policy (CIFP) project in order to assess the implications for Canada of particular international trends or developments and to complete a book, *The Use of Force to Prevent Ethnic Violence*, which was both quantitative and qualitative in scope. In 2004, he was made a Fellow of the Canadian Defence and Foreign Affairs Institute. His work was identified by a variety of Canadian federal government departments including CSIS, DFAIT, CIDA and DND as the potential focal point for developing a contribution to a Canadian-based early warning and conflict prevention capacity. As principal investigator for the CIFP project and through his guidance, this research agenda has grown in several directions. This includes the integration of the CIFP project into a global early warning network, involving local NGOs, think tanks in the US, Europe and Canada and practitioners from developing countries – under the umbrella of the Forum on Early Warning and Early Response.

In addition, Carment has also benefited from several SSHRC grants including his current research project entitled “Transitioning Fragile States: Quantitative and Qualitative Analysis” which seeks to identify the causes of state fragility and provide a context for policy makers to enable strategy in these unstable environments. He has held a SSHRC post-doctoral Fellowship at the Hoover Institution, a NATO Fellowship and several doctoral fellowships. For the last ten years, he has been part of a core group of faculty at NPSIA whose research, teaching, outreach and publications constitute the main contributions towards the activities of the Centre for Security and Defence Studies at Carleton.

Since 1995, he has had an opportunity to present and publish much of his work on fragile states and diaspora processes in Canada and abroad. Outputs from these projects are now being published as peer-reviewed journal articles and in book manuscript form. The research team has also designed a software tool that allows for dynamic data analysis and ongoing country monitoring in collaboration with computer scientists. This ongoing research builds on support from several DFAIT grants, an IDRC grant, and CIDA contribution agreements. Current work has been supported by Criminal Intelligence Services of Canada (CISC), the Department of National Defence, the European Union, the International Peace Academy and Petro-Canada. CIFP’s database, risk assessments and methodology are in use by the private sector including financial risk assessment and insurance companies, as well as multi-national corporations, international organizations such as the UNHCR and the UNDP and a variety of indigenous and international NGOs. The project has trained and employed many student researchers/interns/software developers and analysts from various Carleton University departments such as Economics, Computer Science and NPSIA. In excess of 5000 registered users including representatives from the private sector, domestic and international financial institutions, academia, libraries, the policy field and government offices within Canada and internationally now use the CIFP site.

In the time that he has been at Carleton, Carment has worked with and trained over 40 graduate students independently of his role as supervisor of theses and research essays in pursuit of the above noted research objectives. Several of these students have become co-authors and contributing authors in their own right aside from his book projects. Like his own mentors, he believes that training and co-authorship are integral to achieving high quality research. Term papers for his conflict management class, in which emphasis is placed on peer review and quality written work, have gone on to win several awards and have successfully competed against papers from other Schools of International Affairs. Several of these papers have been

published in the Journal of Public and International Affairs, a peer reviewed journal from APSIA as well as other scholarly journals. In 2004, in recognition of his contributions to teaching, he received a Teaching Award from the Graduate Students Association at Carleton University and was nominated for a similar teaching award by the Faculty of Public Affairs.

Carment is a researcher who has willingly and earnestly demonstrated the impact and effectiveness of embracing collaborative and interdisciplinary initiatives. His work on international public policy is highly regarded in both national and international circles and is influencing policy on both fronts. His supportive role as mentor to graduate students through co-authorship and project involvement makes him a dynamic and remarkable scholar that continues to generate enthusiasm for himself and future researchers.

His research team based out of the Country Indicators for Foreign Policy project (CIFP) have designed an innovative software tool that allows for dynamic data analysis and ongoing country monitoring.. This ongoing research builds on support from both SSHRCC and non-SSHRCC sources. In excess of 5000 registered users including representatives from the private sector, domestic and international financial institutions, academia, libraries, the policy field and government offices within Canada and internationally now use the CIFP site. The CIFP project has been responsible for hiring the largest number of project-related research assistants at NPSIA. CIFP will continue to work with DND and CIDA as the project evolves.

In 2012 The journal received funding from both DND and SSHRC (approximately 25,500.00) to fund an emerging scholars workshop on Canada-Asia. Papers from the workshop were subsequently peer reviewed and published in a special issue of the journal. That issue was co-edited by two NPSIA doctoral students – Eric Jardine and Simon Palamar. In 2013 the Journal was again successful in obtaining a SSHRC grant (Connections) for 40,000 to support the creation of a new scholars virtual network on global governance, organise a workshop on the same topic at the Balsillie School and publish the results of that workshop in peer reviewed form. The issue guest edited by NPSIA PhD student John Cadham and James Manicom a post-doctoral fellow at CIGI will be published in the fall of 2014.
