Course Description

A survey of philosophical classics, on themes of romantic love, self-love, altruistic love, sexuality, eroticism and the passion/reason dichotomy, from Plato's *Symposium* to Foucault's *History of Sexuality*; and an examination of related contemporary issues in light of these perspectives.

Learning Outcomes

This course introduces students to key themes, figures, and debates in the philosophy of love and sex. Students will read some of the most important figures in the history of Western philosophy from Antiquity through the Middle Ages to Modernity. In doing this, they will learn about how our thinking about love and sex has changed over the centuries and why. Students will also be exposed to contemporary debates on the metaphysics of love and sex and on sexual ethics. This will give them an opportunity to practice close reading of philosophical texts and argument reconstruction.

Course Materials

Students do not need to purchase books for this course. All readings will be posted on Brightspace for students' convenience.

Course Requirements

PHIL 1700 is posted as an asynchronous online course. Classes will take the form of synchronous live sessions on Zoom. However, all sessions will be recorded and uploaded onto Brightspace. This means that it is possible to take the course completely asynchronously. Whether students take the course synchronously or asynchronously, they will be expected to keep up with posted materials, including readings and lectures.

Assignments:

Please follow your professor's instructions on how assignments will be handled electronically. There will be NO hard copies placed in the essay box this coming year.

Evaluation:

Standing in a course is determined by the course instructor subject to the approval of the Faculty Dean. This means that grades submitted by the instructor may be subject to revision. No grades are final until they have been approved by the Dean.

Deferrals for Term Work:
