DESCRIPTION

Particular questions must receive particular answers

This course will explore the relationship between philosophy and politics – between thought and action – through a close reading of selected writings by Hannah Arendt. The course will be run as a seminar with individual students assuming responsibility for introducing each of the weekly readings. Evaluation will be based on seminar participation and presentation, take-home exam and a final essay on a topic of your choice.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SEMINAR PRESENTATIONS

1. Identify 2 or 3 aspects of the reading which were the most **interesting** and helpful *to you* and your interests in the context of this course and be prepared to explain and clarify your selection. (Compose one carefully worded paragraph for each point of interest explaining your choice for the 2-page report described in # 4 below.)
2. Identify 2 or 3 aspects of the reading with which you had the most **difficulty** and be prepared to explain why this is so. (Compose one carefully worded paragraph for each point of difficulty clarifying the problems you have with the text for the 2-page report described in # 4 below.)
3. Summarise the **principal argument** of the assigned reading(s) in 2 or 3 sentences.
4. Prepare a 2-page typed, single-space **report** of all of the above to be handed to the instructor at the end of the class.

Assignments:
