ASSIGNMENTS

The final hour of each seminar will be an introduction to the topic of the seminar the following week.

Starting in 3rd week, the first hour or two of each seminar will be taken up with discussion of a student paper. *PAPERS MUST BE CIRCULATED IN ADVANCE*. I will circulate them. Since we have more than ten students, some weeks there will be two student presentations (the best weeks for two presentations are noted in the Schedule) and we will have a 13th seminar in the week after the official end of classes on Apr. 11th (marked ** on the Schedule),

Students will also do a final term paper, which will usually be a rewrite of the seminar paper, responding to comments and doing a substantial exploration of the secondary literature.

Grades will be assigned as follows:

Seminar Presentation	30%
Final Paper	50%
Seminar Participation	20%

I am treating the final paper as a take-home exam, which means that it is due Tuesday, April 25th.

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:

- must not use a plastic or cardboard cover or paper clips

No assignments will be accepted after the last day for handing in term work without advance university approval— see dates below.

- For the Kant course, student may submit their final paper (called a take-home exam) electronically.

Deferrals for Term Work:

If you miss a final examination and/or fail to submit a final assignment by the due date because of circumstances beyond your control, you may apply for a deferral of examination/assignment. For deferred examinations (both formally scheduled and take-homes), you must apply within 3 working days after the scheduled date of the exam.
