### ORGANIZATION/ASSIGNMENTS

The final hour of each seminar will be an introduction to the following week's topic.

Starting in 3<sup>rd</sup> week, the first hour of each seminar will be taken up with discussion of a student paper. *PAPERS MUST BE CIRCULATED IN ADVANCE*. You will send them to me and I will circulate them. If we have more than ten students, some weeks there will be two student presentations. Note that we will have thirteen seminars, not the usual twelve.

Students will also do a final term paper, which will usually be a rewrite of the seminar paper, responding to comments and doing a substantial exploration of some of the secondary literature.

Grades will be assigned as follows:

Seminar Presentation 30% Final Paper 50% Seminar Participation 20%

I am treating the final paper as a take-home exam, which means that it is due Friday, December 22<sup>nd</sup>. **Normally, no extensions are possible.**
