Course description

We'll read and discuss some classical papers pertaining to the philosophy of language tradition inaugurated by Gottlob Frege: we'll start by reading and discussing Frege's 1892 "**Sinn und Bedeutung** (Sense and Reference/Nominatum)" and Frege's 1918 "**Der Gedanke** (The Thought)".

Among the topics we'll discuss there are: (i) reference using proper names, definite descriptions, indexicals, complex demonstratives; (ii) propositional attitudes and the substitutivity problem; (iii) the nature of language, etc.

Aims and Objectives

The module aims to provide a general introduction to the development of some key notions pertaining to the philosophy of language. To do so we'll focus on some classical readings.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the module you should be able to:

- **Understand notions** such as: the sense/reference distinction, the Frege's puzzles, interpretation, the nature of language, etc.

- **Communication skills:** through essays writing and the feedback you will get on them you will further develop the capacity to present problems and propose solutions to them in a clear, precise and concise way. Through discussions you will also have the opportunity to develop the capacity to speak briefly and clearly on a given subject/problem, to ask questions and requests for clarification, and to contribute constructively to discussion.
- You will have lot of opportunities to **interact** with other students in discussing some of the issues we will be dealing with.
