Race in Political Science Classrooms: A Bibliography

In this brief annotated bibliography, we explore the question: How do equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) frameworks reshape and contribute to the study and teaching of political science, particularly in relation to race and disciplinary boundaries? The works assembled here acknowledge the discipline's historical complicity in reproducing intersectional racialized knowledge hierarchies, yet they also illuminate a growing body of scholarship that interrogates these structures and offers alternative methodologies, pedagogies, and institutional interventions. Together, these contributions narrate a shift from the recognition of exclusion to an analysis of its structural and epistemic roots, advancing toward decolonial and antiracist strategies that challenge dominant paradigms. Ultimately, the bibliography highlights a contested yet vital project of disciplinary reckoning—one that seeks to reconfigure what and how we teach, study, and value in political science through the lenses of anti-racism, reflexivity, and justice.

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
