Students in the Honours BA program must complete 9.0 credits in Political Science, 11.0 elective credits, and must be proficient in a language other than English. Students in the BA 3-year program must complete 6.0 credits in Political Science and 9.0 elective credits. Most courses are 3 hours per week for one semester and are worth 0.5 credit.

The Faculty of Public Affairs

The Department of Political Science is part of the **Faculty of Public Affairs** (FPA), which brings together academic units that deal directly with government and civil society, with a mission to foster informed citizenship and help build democracy at home and abroad. It is the only Faculty of its kind in Canada and uniquely suited to its location in Canada's capital city.

With over 225 faculty members, and 8100 students, the Faculty of Public Affairs attracts students and scholars who seek to interact with and bring positive change to the community and world around them.

The Faculty offers undergraduate students hands-on research experience through its Research Experience course (IPAF 4900) and the Carleton University Research Opportunity Program (CUROP). It also offers interdisciplinary courses for undergraduate students, such as Developing and Managing Your Career (IPAF 3800) and Professional Speechwriting (IPAF 4800).

Graduates of our program have gone on to varied careers as diplomats and ambassadors, ministers and deputy ministers, policy analysts, information and communications officers, journalists, lawyers, pollsters, lobbyists, and consultants.

They are employed in the public service at the federal, provincial, and municipal level; non-governmental and international organizations; think tanks and consultancies, and other private sector firms.

Skills & Competencies

Research skills: Locate and evaluate information from a range of sources; analyze and interpret numerical data using statistical techniques; develop qualitative and quantitative research designs.


Analytic skills: Understand complex political issues and policies; read critically; logically synthesize themes, concepts, and information; compare and contrast ideas and perspectives; apply ethical reasoning to problems and issues.

Communications skills: write persuasively for a variety of audiences and in a variety of formats including memos, letters, brief reports, and complex analytics papers.

Teamwork and collaboration: Work collaboratively with others to achieve common objectives; apply interpersonal skills to negotiate and prioritize team goals; assess and manage group dynamics with empathy and respect for others.

Global and intercultural fluency:

Knowledge of and openness to diverse cultures, practices, and politics in Canada and throughout the world; demonstrate inclusiveness and sensitivity with all people.



Exploring Ottawa

Consistently ranked as one of Canada's most livable and safe cities, Ottawa is part of the spectacular National Capital Region, which spans the Ontario-Quebec border, crisscrossed by the Ottawa, Gatineau, and Rideau Rivers. You can explore the region year-round on foot, bicycle, or skis, along hundreds of kilometres of trails and multiuse paths. And of course, the Rideau Canal—a designated UNESCO World-Heritage site—is just steps from Carleton's campus, so you can paddle or skate to the heart of the city to explore Parliament Hill, our national museums and galleries, and the tastes and sounds of the Byward Market.

Ottawa is also known for its many festivals such as Bluesfest, Tulip Festival, Winterlude, and much more.

A Snapshot

With an area of 2796 km², Ottawa and the greater Ottawa region covers more land areas than Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Toronto, and Montreal combined.

Ottawa has the largest tech park and federal employment node in Canada. It's home to a young, vibrant, entrepreneurial workforce, with a bilingual rate of 44%, and more engineers, scientists, and PhDs per capita than any other city in Canada.
