

A decade preparing students to work in and around politics



Before the introduction of the Clayton H. Riddell Graduate Program in Political Management in 2011, formal education and professional skills development in applied politics didn't exist in Canada. People learned on the go, making many mistakes along the way. Foreseeing a need for a structured approach, Carleton University created Canada's first graduate program in political management: a master's degree that can be 1-3 years, providing a professional foundation for students who will play leadership roles in political offices, parties, nongovernmental organizations or firms that specialize in government relations, communications or public opinion research.

The groundbreaking Riddell program has spent more than a decade helping political staff and government relations professionals upgrade their skills and knowledge. It is the first and only program of its kind in Canada.





Our students gain the advantage of having access to Parliament Hill, essential individuals, and vital government institutions in Canada.

Since the program's inception, classes have sometimes met in various rooms in the Centre Block, including the Senate chamber, and elsewhere in the parliamentary precinct. Students have heard from former prime ministers, cabinet ministers, members of Parliament, the clerks of the House of Commons and Senate, deputy ministers, and senior advisers to ministers and party leaders. This access to the centre of government is one of many components that makes the program the only one of its kind in Canada.

With a Master of Political Management (MPM) degree our graduates go on to work for members of Parliament, senators, cabinet ministers, government relations firms, industry associations, and non-governmental organizations. The skills learned in the program prepare alumni to face the halls of government confidently and professionally.

All courses are taught by experienenced practitioners. They include David Colletto, president of Abacus Data, who teaches polling, and Guy Giorno, former campaign manager for the Conservative Party of Canada, who teaches campaigns.

### What can I learn?

The program equips students to contribute to constructive politics, well-informed policy decisions, and the ethical functioning of Canadian politics. All students study ethics, strategic communications, media relations, political writing, and political institutions. Depending on their electives, students may also learn about public opinion research, campaigns, advocacy and government relations, policy development, political marketing, and political leadership.

# Where can I work as a graduate?

Graduates of the Riddell Program work as policy analysts, campaign managers, legislative assistants, communications officers, operations managers, and lobbyists. They are employed by non-governmental organzations, labour unions, industry associations, corporations, and the offices of the prime minister, premiers, federal and provincial Cabinet ministers, senators, members of Parliament, members of the provincial legislatures, and city councillors.

## A foundation like no other!

Carleton University's Master of Political Management offers students a foundation to pursue leadership roles in Canada's parties, political offices, and government relations firms. It is grounded in the academic understanding and critique of democratic processes and institutions.



# **Doris Mah**

# Advance in your career!

Are you already working within a political environment? Do you wish to advance your career, open doors to a bright future?

Consider a flexible approach to earning a Master of Political Management and commit to studying for two to three years part time.

# What are the requirements?

Applicants must:

- Hold an honours baccalaureate or equivalent with a minimum average of a B+ (77%-79%)\*;
- Demonstrate a commitment to and aptitude for political management;
- Have prior involvement in party or campus politics, grassroots organization, political advocacy, or similar experience.

Although there is no formal second language requirement for the degree, individuals aiming for a political career should speak English and French, Canada's two official languages.

Applicants whose first language is not English or have not completed a previous degree at an English-language university must demonstrate fluency in English via any one of the criteria outlined on the Graduate Admissions website.

\*We have accepted applicants who have not met this requirement if they have extensive professional experience in political management.




