COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

Why do people commit crime? What factors place individuals at a greater risk for committing crimes? What factors or interventions reduce the chance of justice-involved individuals from committing additional crimes? The goal of this course is to provide a critical review of the psychology of criminal conduct. We will focus our discussions around three central components:

1) theory – what is our theoretical understanding? 2) research – what does the current research tell us? and 3) practical utility – how can we put theory and research into practice? The first half of the course provides the foundation on the theoretical and practical understanding of criminal behaviour and the second half of the course provides a deep dive into specific types of offending behaviours. In addition to learning about criminal behaviour, we will develop fundamental skills including reading and understanding empirical research, summarizing information by writing clearly, critical thinking, problem solving, and innovation (applying new approaches and knowledge). Learning will be multimodal, through videos, discussions, activities, and podcasts. The delivery is asynchronous (no 'live' lectures), but there are set deadlines across the term and optional virtual coffee chats before notable deadlines.

EVALUATION (SUBJECT TO CHANGE)

You will be evaluated through one online mid-term and one online final exam (multiple choice and short answers) and participation components (discussion posts, reflective 2-paragraph papers). Bonus marks can be obtained through optional activities.
