COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

The course provides a broad overview of police psychology. The course exposes students to the domains within which police psychologists work and to theories and methods that police researchers use to understand various aspects of police work. Topics will include evidence-based policing, police selection, police stress, police investigations, police discretion, police use of force, and police management. PSYC 3404 is highly interactive and relies heavily on discussions and activities. This course also depends on lectures from the instructor and guest presenters who are either police researchers or police practitioners. The goal of this course is for students to leave with a solid foundation of knowledge for the content, both from a research perspective and from the perspective of individuals who work within the policing system (as officers, psychologists, or researchers).
