COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

This course examines how people become who they are. Despite the official course name, this course will cover theories and research of both social and personality development from infancy to adulthood. We will study how infants begin to form social relationships early on in their lives. We will review research that presents theories describing how individual differences develop (e.g., emotions, temperament, personality traits). We will cover a range of topics including the self and social cognition, external and internal processes in social and personality development focused on self-concept, identity, morality, achievement, and aggression. We will consider how the self, peers, family, and culture influence and are influenced by the transition through adolescence. We will also consider these influences on development in emerging adulthood and throughout the lifespan.
