COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

This course provides students with an overview of the biological, social, and cognitive process that occur during the developmental stages of adolescence and emerging adulthood. Course content will explore the developmental changes that take place as children transition into early adolescence, changes that occur throughout the adolescent years, and as late teens develop into young adults. Implications of divergent development will be discussed.

A major goal of the course is for students to critically examine the implications of these changes for social, emotional, and cognitive growth and development while applying theories and discussion to relevant community/real work events that impact individuals and society.

By the end of the course, students will be able to apply and differentiate typical and divergent adolescent development, synthesize, and apply course content to real-life contexts, and use academic language and explain concepts to a layperson.
