COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

This course involves critical evaluation of research and theory on physical, social, and cyber bullying and victimization in childhood, adolescence and early adulthood. It will provide the opportunity for an in-depth examination of these behaviours. Bullying is and has been an unfortunately reality of school environments for many years. More recently, it has reached beyond school to the online environment. This course will give you a good understanding of bullying and cyberbullying. We will examine risk factors, prevalence, social processes that support bully-victim relationships, mental health consequences, as well as the most current approaches to preventing and responding to bullying/cyberbullying.
