COURSE DESCRIPTION/INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

Human Neuropsychology I-PSYC2307-B: This course focuses on investigating brain-behavior relationships. Starting with an in-depth exploration of neuroanatomy, students will learn about brain anatomy and the physiology of the human nervous system. By exploring different neuroimaging techniques used to examine the brain, students will be able to link how specific brain regions are related to our cognitive functions such as memory, language, and emotions. Additional factors that can affect our brain and cognitive functioning will be examined, including drugs, hormones, and sleep. Further exploration into how researchers and clinicians use a combination of neuroimaging and cognitive testing to diagnose and study developmental, neurological, neurodegenerative, and neuropsychiatric disorders.
