Introduction to Hebrew RELI 1010 and 2010*

Course Description

This course aims to provide students with a basic knowledge of Hebrew grammar that is applicable to both Biblical and Modern Hebrew as well as some reading experience in either Biblical or Modern Hebrew. RELI 1010 will involve a rigorous introduction to the grammar of the language, including the verbal system, types and classes of nouns, and syntax. In RELI 2010, students may specialize in either Biblical or Modern Hebrew and pursue directed readings that pertain to these stages in the Hebrew language.

***NOTE:** it is not necessary to also register for RELI 2010 in order to take RELI 1010, but RELI 1010 is a prerequisite for registration in RELI 2010.

***NOTE 2:** each of these courses are worth one full credit (1.0), so are the equivalent of a full-year course. While there are only 6 class hours per week, the expectation is that you will spend another 15+ hours each week on your own learning the material in order to fulfill the required credit hours for each of these courses, to finish 1010 with beginner level instruction and 2010 with intermediate level understanding of the Hebrew language.

Learning Objectives

Students will learn:

- The basic structure of northwest Semitic languages
- Hebrew alphabet, grammar, and syntax
- Common (regular and irregular) Hebrew nouns and verbs, as well as how to parse them
- Reading knowledge of biblical and/or modern Hebrew
- How to translate from Hebrew to English, orally and in writing
- How to translate from English to Hebrew, orally and in writing.

There's a really helpful website called pealim that will give you complete verbal paradigms and paradigms for nouns. I encourage you to use this site as a reference and to check your answers on paradigm assignments.

Vocabulary

For a good paper copy that will give you the meaning of roots and then break them down based on their grammatical type, you may consider purchasing the *Brown-Driver-Briggs Hebrew and*

English Lexicon. This resource is more helpful for Biblical Hebrew and Aramaic, but still provides useful etymological insights and looks great on a coffee table if you choose the Modern track!

Not all online dictionary resources are created equal. Google translate can be helpful, but it often doesn't give you the best translation possible. I suggest Morfix instead. This site offers much more accurate translations, especially for modern material.

Biblical Hebrew

The *Brown-Driver-Briggs* mentioned above is a great tool. Additionally, there are some websites that have come in handy for me over the years. Bible Hub is designed for confessional study of the Hebrew Bible and New Testament, but, if you use it in either Hebrew or Greek, it will show you the text (sometimes verse numbers are a bit off) and parse all of the verbs for you. This offers a great way for you to check your own grammatical analysis. Further, Sefaria is a living library of Jewish texts that has the entire Tanakh and Rabbinic commentaries all available for free online. The biblical readings all have the JPS translation right under them (though you can turn that off for a challenge!). Feel free to use this online resource for biblical readings if you prefer not to buy a Hebrew Bible.

Course Obligations

Meetings

During the May-June semester, this class will meet via Skype on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:00 am – 12:00 pm EST. The first two hours will involve lecturing on grammatical concepts and some activities. The final hour will be a kind of office hour during which I will take questions and offer one-on-one meetings. During the July-August semester, students may discuss a meeting time according to their desired specialization. Each track (Biblical and Modern) will meet for a total of three hours per week during the late summer term.

Assignments

Assignments are listed for each lesson and involve applying what we discussed in our lesson to a worksheet. I will distribute the worksheets for each lesson in advance. They will be in electronic format so you can easily fill them out on your computers or print them and send them back in scan format. These are all short assignments designed to encourage you to practice the grammatical concepts that we have been learning. They are each worth 10 points, for a total of 180 points in the course. All assignments are due the next day by noon. They will be graded and returned by 8:00 pm on the evening before our next meeting.

- **Paradigm Assignments:** these involve writing out a full verbal paradigm (participle, perfect, imperfect, imperative, and infinitive) for the verbal system that we are working on that week. I will offer you a choice of five roots for each assignment, from which you can choose two per assignment. I definitely advise you to do more in your spare time, as you are able.
- **Translation Assignments:** these are designed to coach you to write in short and simple Hebrew sentences. They will draw upon the grammatical concepts that we have covered throughout the week. I will provide you with sentences in English and you will translate them into Hebrew using the appropriate verbal forms.

Session #1 Final Exam

This exam will deal with the main grammatical concepts covered in this term. It will be a take-home written exam that requires producing verbal paradigms, generating object and possessive suffixes, and identifying and translating nouns.

Session #2 Final Exam

This will be a one-on-one oral exam conducted via Skype on a date within the exam period at the end of the late summer term. Students will be asked to prepare to read and translate a short passage and will then be asked grammatical questions about the passage that they have just read. Students may select a passage in advance from our reading list or confer with me if they wish to use a text not on the syllabus.

Grading

This is a language class, and so your grade (and your success) will rely heavily on attendance and participation. Accordingly, the greatest weight is given to your attendance and participation. This includes attending all meetings and being on time. Should you need to miss any classes, please let me know. I'm happy to work with you on serious commitments but cannot tolerate more than three absences per term in an intensive course of this nature. The main course work in this class will involve keeping up with the readings from the textbook (which should be completed before each class in which we discuss them) and short assignments for every lesson that should keep you on track with memorizing paradigms and absorbing vocabulary.

Medical documents must specify the date of the onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time of the examination. The University's preferred medical form can be found at the Registrar's Office [forms and fees page](#).

Withdrawal From Courses

Withdrawn. No academic credit, no impact on the CGPA. WDN is a permanent notation that appears on the official transcript for students who withdraw after the full fee adjustment date in each term (noted in the Academic Year section of the Calendar each term). Students may withdraw on or before the last day of classes.
