Topics in Judaism: Hebrew Bible Rabbi Dr. Reuven P. Bulka

Course begins Wednesday, September 16, 2009, and runs on Wednesdays (1805-2055), to December 2, 2009.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Explores the roots of the primary values in Judaism, derived from the scriptural texts. These include sanctity of life, ethical principles, respect for person and property, speech regulations, and attitudes.

Evaluation

The final mark will fuse together class involvement (20%); the term paper (40%) and the final exam (40%).

Term paper proposals and outline are due by October 28, 2000. Late penalty is 2% per week.

The term paper is due by November 25, 2009. Maximun of 5 pages, typed and double-spaced. Late penalty is 1% per day.

The final exam will be a Take-Home (choice of 2 of 3 essay topics), given on the last day of class and **due** on the last day of the exam period (**December 22, 2009**) by **4:00 p.m.**, to be placed in the DROP BOX outside Room 2A39 Paterson Hall.

COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They range from a mark of zero for the plagiarized work to a final grade of "F" for the course, and even suspension from all studies or expulsion from the University.
