

Community Engaged Learning (CEL) is a method of experiential learning that encourages action, reflection and real-world engagement. It allows people to participate in hands-on experiences while gaining critical thinking, problem solving and reflection skills through creating mutually beneficial relationships between individuals and communities. It also allows students to link their academic experiences to their communitities.

Campus to Community

Campus to Community (C2C) Days are half-day sessions where students participate in service work with communities in the Greater Ottawa area throughout the whole academic year.

This January, Carleton students partnered with Ausome Ottawa and helped support children with autism through basketball on January 26th, and supported their Soccer and Get Moving program on February 12th. Also, on February 4th, the Campus to Community group supported the In From The Cold Program at Parkdale United Church. Our Ravens have been very involved and helping within the Ottawa community!

March 9th we are partnering with Ausome Ottawa and supporting children with autism through soccer! Then, on March 11th we are returning to Parkdale United Church to help serve meals and assist with clean-up for the In From The Cold Program.

One of the organizations that our Ravens are partnering with this term for Campus to Community is In From The Cold. This program operates out of Parkdale United Church. It brings together members of Parkdale United Church and volunteers from the wider community to support guests experiencing poverty or other challenges by providing 4 course meals. Over 90 volunteers work each week to help cook and prepare the meals for 120 to 150 guests; a steady increase from only 35 guests in November 2002.
