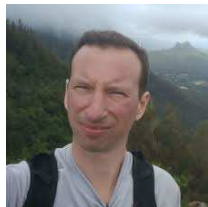

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# Masters in linguistics

- 2-year MA in linguistics
- Focus on core areas of linguistic theory, with exposure to interfaces
- Thesis stream, essay stream
- Course requirements:
  - 0.5 in “sound” (Phonetics, phonology)
  - 0.5 in “structure” (Morphology, syntax, semantics)
  - 1.5 electives (0.5 in LING, 1 free)
  - 2.5 thesis
  - (Essay has more courses)

# PhD in linguistics

- (Formerly known as “Linguistics, language documentation, and revitalization”)
- Flexible, individualized program
- Courses:
  - Scholarly Preparation in Linguistics (6001, 6002)
  - 0.5 in “sound” (Phonetics, phonology)
  - 0.5 in “structure” (Morphology, syntax, semantics)
  - 0.5 in “methods” (Data collection methods, documentation, revitalization)
  - 1.0 credits electives (LING, ALDS, ANTH, CGSC)
  - Qualifying paper (completed in fall of year 2)
  - Comp exam (completed in winter/summer of year 2)
  - Thesis

## Next steps

After you've started your coursework. . .

- Start thinking about longer-term plans:
  - What would you like to work on for your thesis (MA), QP (PhD)?
  - Who would you like your supervisor to be?
  - Once you find your supervisor, complete the “Letter of understanding” between supervisor and student (see Grad Guide)
- You will meet with the Graduate Supervisor in the first two months to discuss these plans and your goals in the program.
- Select thesis advisor by winter of year 1 at the latest.
- Apply for funding!

## Annual review of students

- Annually by March 15th, all students submit a completed “annual review form” (see Grad Guide), listing their activities and accomplishments over the year, and plans for next year
- This form is not so much an “evaluation” for a grade, but rather a tool for information sharing between faculty members, so that we are aware of what is happening in the program and who is doing what



## Reading group, aka “Scholarly Preparation”

- Most weeks we have a “reading group” meeting (Wednesdays at 14:30 this year)
- The reading group is an informal venue for any of the following:
  - Presentations of current work (faculty and students)
  - Discussion of articles and other readings
  - Dry-runs for conference talks
- Additionally, there will be “professional development” events, such as a workshop on how to write a funding application
