### Why you should study Portuguese

With more than 260 million speakers, Portuguese is the world's 7<sup>th</sup> most common 1<sup>st</sup> language, official language of Portugal, Brazil, and 6 African nations, and an official language of the EU. Also, did you know there are more Portuguese speakers in Brazil than Portugal, 187 million vs. 10 million; although, both sides will say major differences exist between Brazilian and European Portuguese.

At Carleton, instructors teach primarily Brazilian Portuguese and our interactive classes emphasize language you can use in real life; maybe on your next trip to Rio de Janeiro for Carnaval!

As well, if you're studying French, Spanish, or Italian, you'll enjoy the many similarities Portuguese shares with the other Romance languages.
