Course Description and Objectives:

This course is an introduction to sociological inquiry or the systematic study of individual behaviour within social groups and of society as a whole and social institutions. It examines all of the stages of the research process from formulating questions, selecting appropriate methods, and analyzing data and reporting findings. Topics include the: epistemological foundations of social research; relationship between theory and data; techniques for the collection and analysis of quantitative and qualitative data; and research ethics.

The course will prepare students to critically evaluate and carry-out independent social research and for more advanced courses in research methods. The two-hour lecture (per class) is designed to provide an essential understanding of these topics. The lecture is followed by a one-hour tutorial as needed. Lectures, tutorials, exams, and office hours will be delivered synchronously (in real-time) through Zoom's video conferencing platform.
