Keeping secrets. Exposing secrets. Hiding in the closet. Leaking information. Spreading rumours. Conspiring. These are just some of the ways that secrets shape our social interactions, configure identities, and generate power relations within contemporary societies. But how can we research secrecy, especially when the very object we seek to research may be designed to evade public scrutiny? This course offers an introduction to secrecy studies. It looks at theories and concepts of secrecy, methods for researching secrecy, and cases and contexts where we can study secrecy in action. It will give students the tools to undertake case-based research on secrecy topics of their choice.
