

Scholarship for SOAN Undergraduate Indigenous, Black and Racialized Students

Terms and Eligibility

Value \$1,000. Awarded annually by the Department of Sociology and Anthropology on the recommendation of the Chair of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology to an outstanding Indigenous, Black or Racialized student enrolled in an undergraduate program in Sociology or Anthropology. Application is required.

The aim of this scholarship is to support outstanding Indigenous, Black, and racialized undergraduate students in Sociology and Anthropology **with a priority given to those** who are coming from families in which they belong to the first generation attending university.

Faculty and students in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at Carleton University pursue a wide range of academic, community, and pedagogical interests. Both the Sociology and Anthropology programs are committed to social justice, critical thinking, and rigorous research and teaching. We help students develop skills for addressing social issues across a range of contexts. Research and courses within the department touch on citizenship, globalization, migration, cultural studies, gender and feminist theories, criminology, social movements, youth cultures, race and racialization, childhood studies, political economy, education, symbolism, rituals, colonialism, health, labour, development, Indigenous issues, environment, and language, to name only a few.

In light of growing anti-racism and decolonization efforts and our recognition that we are working on a campus located on unceded Algonquin Anishinaabe territory, we are starting to systematically apply this social justice lens in a tangible way to our own programs and department. Recognizing that Indigenous, Black and racialized students are typically underrepresented in academia, and more likely to be systemically disadvantaged and oppressed by historical and contemporary inequities, we are establishing this award to honor and support academic excellence among Black, Indigenous and Racialized undergraduate students in one of our Sociology or Anthropology BA programs. The award normally alternates between a Sociology undergraduate student and an Anthropology undergraduate student. For the 2022-23 academic year, it is directed towards students in Sociology.

This award is valued at \$1,000 for the 2022/2023 academic year.

General Eligibility Criteria

- Indigenous, Black or Racialized undergraduate students enrolled full-time in a BA program in Sociology or Anthropology.
- Demonstrated academic potential and/or dedication to promoting social justice and social change.
- Demonstrated contribution to the Sociology or Anthropology program at Carleton and/or to their Indigenous or racialized community.
