## Introduction to Socio-Cultural Anthropology

What does it mean to be human? Anthropologists have approached this question by using the ethnographic method to understand the diverse ways people create shared worlds of meaning. In this course students will learn how culture shapes experience, and how ethnography describes this process. Precludes additional credit for ANTH 1000 (no longer offered), HUMS 1005 (no longer offered). Lectures/discussions three hours a week.

## **Learning Objectives**

- To gain an understanding of the history of anthropology
- To become conversant in the terminology and theory of anthropology
- To gain a grasp of the rudiments of ethnographic research

## Course Requirements and Assignments

#### **Tutorials**

Students are assigned a tutorial group when they register in this course and are responsible for participating in the tutorial sessions. Tutorial sessions will be held weekly after class by your Teaching Assistant beginning on Wednesday, September 16<sup>th</sup>, 2023, and ending on Wednesday, November 29<sup>th</sup>, 2023. Note then, that there are no tutorials after the first lecture, the midterm, and the last lecture. Further details will be announced in the first week of classes.

The tutorials account for 20% of your course mark, which includes 5% for the Annotated Bibliography (Due on Oct. 4<sup>th</sup>) and 15% for Participation (Note: the Participation structure is up to your TA but includes attendance and some written exercises). Tutorials are also held to review readings and lecture material, provide further explanation of, and assistance with, the term's assignments.

#### Mid-term

There is one mid-term examination held on October 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023. This will be 2 hours in duration. The aim is to familiarise you with the exam process and the type of material covered. Details to follow before this date.

## Ethnographic Research - Essay

Students may conduct a detailed (but short) ethnographic project, details of which are posted on the course website. Alternatively, a research essay on any topic chosen from the course essay list file may be undertaken. Five - six pages of text, along with a bibliography, will be the requirement for either of these assignments. The due date for the Ethnography - Essay assignment is **November 15**<sup>th</sup>. Detailed instructions will be provided at the beginning of the semester.

## Final Assignment

The Final Assignment will be handed out in class on **Nov. 22**<sup>nd</sup>, **2023**, and due on **Dec. 6**<sup>th</sup>. Details will be provided early in the semester.

## What are the Penalties for Plagiarism?

## What are the Procedures?

The Dean writes to the student and the University Ombudsperson about the alleged plagiarism. The Dean reviews the allegation. If it is not resolved at this level then it is referred to a tribunal appointed by the Senate.
