Course Description and Objectives:

This course will further explore and expand upon the key thinkers, concepts, and disciplinary subfields in sociology. The focus of analysis will shift from the everyday world (SOCI 1001) to social institutions and structural processes. Topics include globalization, education, media, health, social movements, and colonialism.

Learning Outcomes

- Foundational comprehension of the relationship between social structure and social orders
- Applied understanding of the TRC Calls to Actions as a structured response to settler colonialism
- Development of writing skills: writing concisely and clearly, like a social scientist
- Time management, interpersonal communication, and collaboration skills
- Critical thinking and intellectual attribution

Diversity and Inclusion in Learning



In-Class APA Writing Activities: Worth 50% of final mark (or 12.5% each)



- Students collaborate to craft 4 short formal responses using APA Formatting
- Activities are completed and submitted in the Revel E-Workbook/Text
- Submissions reflect engagement with required readings and class activity.
- Submissions abide by word limits outlined in instructions in Revel E-Workbook/Text
- Most submissions are 1 paragraph (but may be 2 paragraphs).

Shared Writing Activities: Worth 20% of final mark (or 2 % each)



As you read through the required text, there will be 10 "Shared Writing" opportunities.

- You and your peers reflect on a writing prompt, which is shared in the E-Workbook

- To receive full marks, submission must demonstrate engagement with readings.

Late Submission Policy

What are the Procedures?
