Course Requirements & Methods of Evaluation:

This assignment is an opportunity to reflect deeply on your work as a collaborative learner. - 2. Research Paper. Pick a topic from the following:
 - a. Gender, Constructions of the Family and Settler Colonialism.
 - b. Arts-Based Research and Reimagining Decolonial Futurity.
 - c. Power, Gaming and Constructions of Identity and Belonging.
 - d. Unpacking Xenophobia, Imperialism and the 'war on terror' (using Jodi Byrd's analysis among others).
 - e. A topic of your choosing, with intersectionality and settler colonial studies built in as a framework of analysis.

Notes: Include academic journals and books, this is an academic paper so an appropriate number of sources should be included. Cite properly using Chicago Style which also includes instructions for the overall style of the paper and works sited. Situate yourself in the work; it is ok to use 'I' pronouns. The paper can relate to something you're grown interested in during your time as a Sociology student, but it's ok if you veer into something new. Your mark is based on writing, grammar, style, as well as critical thinking and comprehension of literature in the area you are writing. Submit on Dropbox.
