Course Description and Objectives:

The course examines how family patterns and relationships are shaped by economic and social structures. It explores diverse family forms across different historical periods and provides an indepth look at contemporary families, particularly in North America. The course also examines how family experiences are influenced by various intersecting identities, including gender, social class, race/ethnicity, indigenous status, and sexuality.

Learning Outcomes:

After you complete this course, it is expected that you will be able to:

- identify and critique common myths about the family
- examine how family patterns and ideologies have varied across time and space
- explain various theoretical approaches used in the study of the family
- analyze how factors such as social class, indigeneity/ race/ethnicity/immigrant status, sexuality and gender impact families and shape family experiences and relationships.
- apply course concepts and ideas to contemporary issues and debates about the family
- write critically about family-related topics.

Course Requirements & Methods of Evaluation:
