**Course Description and Objectives:**

Topics may include globalization, education, media, health, social movements, colonialism, urbanization.

- 1) Apply the sociological imagination to a variety of contemporary social phenomena.
- 2) Describe the historical development of Sociology as a separate social science discipline.
- 3) Identify, compare, and apply primary sociological perspectives.
- 4) Explain and apply key sociological concepts.
- 5) Describe the basic dimensions of social inequality & social change in historical and contemporary society.
