COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

Race and ethnicity are two of the defining and divisive features of society today. This course will provide a sociological understanding of how race and ethnicity shape our identities, experiences, and outcomes. The course will explore the historical, economic, political, and social factors shaping and being shaped by race and ethnicity. It will begin by looking at the key definitions, concepts, and theories of race and ethnicity. Students will then be encouraged to apply these concepts to understand and discuss “new racism” in contemporary society through experiences of race and ethnicity in institutions and everyday practices. The course will look at racism on the

individual, institutional/system, and structural levels. Particular attention will be given to the Canadian context.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Understand how the social constructs of ethnicity and race shape identities and life experiences
- Apply sociological theoretical concepts to explain real-life experiences with ethnicity and race
- Understand the link between ethnicity/race at the individual and institutional levels
- Critically evaluate the social construction of social practices
- Communicate sociological knowledge in a concise and clear manner in writing and discussions.
